

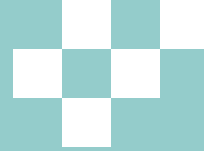

How do I report ASB?

If you are experiencing anti-social behaviour in your area, visit www.west-midlands.police.uk to find advice and information.

Action to solve your concerns may be initiated by a number of agencies including the police, local authorities, registered social landlords, housing trusts and youth offending teams.

You can also report your concerns by attending one of the many local neighbourhood tasking meetings in your area. Details of these meetings can be found on our website www.west-midlands.police.uk/your-local-police

These meetings enable members of the community to meet with the local officers to discuss issues or concerns and have a real influence on local policing priorities.

Tackling anti-social behaviour

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) is any activity that impacts on your life in a negative way, including selfish and unacceptable activities that can blight your quality of life.

West Midlands Police is committed to tackling this sort of behaviour.



Examples of anti-social behaviour include:

- Nuisance neighbours
- Rowdy and nuisance behaviour
- Yobbish behaviour and intimidating groups taking over public spaces
- Vandalism, graffiti and fly-posting
- People dealing and buying drugs on the street
- People dumping rubbish and abandoning cars
- Begging and anti-social drinking
- The misuse of fireworks
- The misuse of mini-motos
