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Out and About visit to 'The Lock up'



Pupils have had a great learning opportunity and fun at the West Midland's Police Museum this half term. As well as seeing inside the cells and experiencing how conditions have changed from using buckets as toilets when the police station was first built in Victorian times, to metal in cell toilets, when the cells ceased use in 2016.

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Pupils saw displays of the history of policing, which included uniforms (which they were able to try on), tasers, handcuffs, breathalyzers, stingers, speed cameras, a model of a police horse, bicycles and motorbikes, fingerprinting, tape recording interviews, DNA, corporal punishment, honoured police officers, the Peaky Blinders, forensics and a genuine police box (as in the tardis).

KIDZANIA-9.2.23



In February we took our Year 9 pupils to Kidzania, in London. After a smooth journey, we enjoyed the valet parking lounge, where both classes reconvened and ate lunch before strolling to the Kidzania entrance.



Once inside the pupils had the opportunity to sample a variety of careers and earn kidzo currency. This can be spent on experiences inside the Kidzania indoor town. Examples of work range from cleaning windows to hosting the TV news, delivering packages or performing dentistry, performing in the theatre or being a firefighter, over 33 different roles.

The vast majority of pupils did very well and had an entertaining, educational and fun packed day.



Some learnt the virtue of patience whilst queuing. One pupil gave up his place in the queue to a disabled pupil from another school.

Several pupils flew a plane, sitting in a real cockpit of an actual Boeing aeroplane and gaining their pilot wings.



On departure we avoided the city congestion by leaving Westfield to travel an hour up the motorway to enjoy a relaxed meal in Wetherspoons at Beaconsfield Services; arriving back at school at around 6.45 pm.

BUSY TIME IN OUT AND ABOUT LESSONS

BUILDING SITE VISIT

Pupils have really enjoyed re-visiting the Lovell Homes development at Lockside, Walsall. We were invited back after we enjoyed laying bricks there last year as a careers experience as part of out and about lessons.



This year, we have visited the show homes and also seen first and second fix houses with electrics, plumbing and plastering underway. Pupils were made aware of the 120 job roles within the building industry such as marketing, Health and Safety, Human Resources etc.

Pupils also enjoyed wearing all the PPE. The virtues of trust and focus have been practiced among others. It was a constructive experience for all.

CORDAGE (STRING MAKING) NATURAL AND NOT!!



Elmwood pupils have enjoyed the process of creating string from natural materials, learning that nettles make an excellent resource, as does lime bark, raffia and others.

The virtue of patience was practiced with a technique involving a specific twisting of the fibres to create cord. Great satisfaction has come from creating a friendship bracelet for themselves.

Pupils also learnt the ancient craft of processing flax stalks into linen strands. To create, (a virtue), the flaxen hair-like threads you first break and stretch the outer coarse casings. This is then hackled away and later combed to leave the threads that can be turned into linen cloth, rope or combined with linseed oil to create linoleum or even boat building materials!

The final rotation was a very new technology whereby twine is constructed from 2 litre plastic bottles using a special tool. This required the virtue of determination to get the knack, just right. Once mastered it was great fun making reels of the cord, which is exceptionally strong.



All have added a new skill to their repertoire, you could say a new string to their bow!

FIRE MAKING

Classes have been learning the art of fire lighting. This practiced the virtues of self reliance and cooperation at different stages of the task.

Initially, they created sparks from the ancient flint and steel method, casting these onto the charred cloth to start a fire. We then moved onto using a modern ferro rod of high carbon with a striker to light cotton wool, which was then extended by adding petroleum jelly to lengthen the burn time. This also combined scientific thinking to the project. This was then practiced on natural materials. The final challenge was to work as a team to create friction fire with bow and drill. The difference from what you may have seen on the television is that this was with a giant sized set where responsibility (virtue) was key to their different roles in the process.

The lesson has sparked a lot of interest amongst the pupils.
