LIFE SKILLS OPPORTUNITY

During this final half term of the academic year we begin focussing on the transition for our Year 11 pupils as they start to ready themselves for life after Elmwood. This can be a challenging time as pupils who have invariably spent 5 years in the supportive bubble of Elmwood life, need to start thinking about operating without the support of trusted staff, without the familiarity of our surroundings, but very much with the academic and social skills they have learned during their time with us. This can feel exciting and scary in equal

measure so I'm incredibly proud that a proportion of our Year 11 boys have been able to access a transitional programme that has allowed them to successfully engage with an intervention run by Brightstar Boxing for a period of 6 weeks.

During this time pupils attended the academy 2 days a week to enable them to take on new challenges, meet new people and learn new skills – but still with the support and familiarity of each other. The scheme focuses on improving Aspiration, Respect, be Inspirational, support Self-discipline, and be Empowering (ASPIRE).


Pupils were delighted when their participation to the scheme was also recognised by the BBC so our young men enjoyed their 5 minutes of fame appearing on Midlands Today and also in the Express & Star. They made a fabulous first impression and staff at the boxing academy shared several positive comments stating one pupil 'engages in lesson time and always puts in maximum effort with lots of energy'. Another 'really enjoyed being here and was very polite and well mannered, was very talkative and likes to engage with everyone'. Finally- one pupil 'was somewhat the captain of the group, likes to make sure everything is in order with his peers'.

The boys showed growth and development throughout the half term of attending and I'm sure they have taken on even more life skills that they will be able to draw upon in the forthcoming months as we continue to gallop towards the end of Year 11. 



Science in the woods - surely not!



A group of year 10s pupils recently spent a day in the woods in Leicestershire to enhance their science learning. The pupils explored energy transfer in waves. A rope allowed them to produce a transverse wave, the faster the rope was moved the greater the wavelength. The greater the force, the larger the amplitude. Pupils were also able to feel an echo through the rope – an echo occurs when sound waves are reflected towards the hearer.





A fun day was had by all and we learnt that that if you stand to close to a rope making waves, you could get Hertz.

The day helped the young people to think about energy transfers in real life situations. They used friction, and then the sun, to start fire. Later they explored elastic energy firing a catapult.
